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President Wyclef Jean?

The Haitian-American musician hopes to lead Haiti towards a brighter future

Never heard it.

In 2004, Wyclef Jean released *Welcome to Haiti: Creole 101*. The album included a song, "President," where Jean painted a picture of poverty and what he would do to fight it if he were elected president.

Is he qualified? Are there requirements different the Those song lyrics might come in handy, as would lessons in Creole—a kind of French that people in Haiti speak. Yesterday, in an interview with TIME magazine, Jean announced that he was running for President of Haiti.

For many of his fans, his announcement wasn't a surprise. Jean has been active in raising money and providing aid for Haiti, especially after this year's devastating earthquake. "If not for the earthquake, I probably would have waited another 10 years before doing this," Jean says. "The quake drove home to me that Haiti can't wait another 10 years for us to bring it into the 21st century," he told TIME. The singer went on to discuss his ideas to help fix the Caribbean island-nation's many problems.

## From "Fugee" to Fundraiser

Jean was 9 years old when he moved from He land Haiti to the United States where he was sometimes bullied for being Haitian. But sometimes bullied for being Haitian. But sometimes he has stayed proud of his heritage and often included it in his art. As a founding member of The Fugees, a hip-hop group famous in the 1990s, and as a solo artist, he used both rhythms and lyrics that have their roots in Haitian culture and music.

Besides starting a music group, Jean founded Yéle Haiti in 2005. The organization helped raise millions of dollars for relief efforts in Haiti after the

January earthquake that killed 200,000 people and destroyed much of Port-au-Prince, the nation's capital. But he told TIME the experience of traveling to Haiti to help with relief efforts inspired him to do more than raise money.

"I knew I'd have to take the next step," Jean said, adding that if putting his music on hold was ever stopping him from running for president, "then everything I've been singing about, like equal rights, doesn't mean anything."

#### If I Were President

Jean's campaign for the presidency of Haiti is expected to have a lot of popularity among Haiti's young population, who Jean says "doesn't believe in [its] politicians anymore." His hopeful attitude for the future contributes to his plan to modernize Haiti—something the country hasn't been able to do because of its history of poverty, violence, natural disasters and often dishonest leaders.

But not everyone is welcoming to Jean. The country's powerful wealthy class doesn't like the fact that he hasn't lived in Haiti since he was 9, although he only needs to have lived there for 5 years to run for president. And he was accused of taking money from Yéle Haiti for his own projects recently. Although he denied it, and said it was a mistake in keeping track of the donation money, it is an example of Jean's lack of leadership experience.

Jean plans to officially announce his candidacy before the deadline on August 7. And he hopes to use his fame and his ideas to improve the country of his birth.

"I want to be part of a different kind of celebrity," Jean told TIME. "One that thinks not just about charity but policy."
