Why Do Canadians Celebrate Victoria Day?

After she died in 1901 the Canadian government declared that her birthday, May 24th or the second last Monday in May, would be a national holiday in her honour.

Until 1956 Canada celebrated the birthday of the British monarch, king or queen, on that day. In fact, in Canada, the official birthday celebration of Queen Elizabeth II is celebrated on Victoria Day even though her real birthday is April 21st.
